

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1. INTRODUCTION

Sree Saraswathi Thyagaraja College (STC), founded by V.S.V. Vidya Mandir Trust during 1997 with an objective to meet the higher educational needs of the rural as well as the urban youth in and around Pollachi and other districts of Tamil Nadu, has become the cynosure of everyone and has won the confidence of the people as an institution of excellence with discipline, quality, and values. The trust was formed by the three great visionaries of the three Philanthropic families – Thiru. P.M. Thyagarajan, Thiru. M.K. Arumugam and Thiru. D. Sivaraman.

And now the institution is ably run and professionally managed by the service-minded business legal heirs, Thiru. T. Sethupati as Chairman, Thiru. S. Venkatesh as Vice-Chairman and Thiru. M.A. Vijayamoghan as Secretary. Our former Director General Dr. M. Settu was a brilliant corporate wizard who is no more, played a major role with his road map, strategic guidance, and meticulous planning in transforming the institution into an excellent one and his atman ever remains as the guiding spirit of STC for its great leap.

STC stands unique and majestic with its 'A' grade twice by NAAC, Autonomous Status, ISO certification 21001 -2018, the 2nd Best College Award among the affiliated colleges of Bharathiar University and the Second Rank holder in Sports and Athletics continuously during the last twelve years. Beginning its academic YATRA with a skeleton strength and from 1997 it is strong as on date with 3200 students. Being Co-Educational and autonomous it has several unique best practices, inclusive of need-based curricula, and outcome-based programmes. A new building named VSV Centre for Advanced Studies with all modern amenities has been opened to enhance the teaching and learning experiences and research pursuits and for accommodating the new and latest programmes introduced. It has several scholarship schemes for students who are meritorious, economically backward and extra-ordinarily proficient. The institution has also introduced a special scholarship scheme through STC MSET for UG and PG students from 2019 onwards. Nearly Rs.10 crores have been disbursed to students as scholarships since 2004-05. Since its inception, Sree Saraswathi Thyagaraja College, upon much deliberations among the stakeholders, has evolved its philosophy – "When an Institution becomes very important to the society, it no longer belongs only to its founders, but to the whole society"

The Year 2020 is historically significant for the proposed transformation of Higher Education in India. As STC is already an autonomous college in 2008 and twice accredited by NAAC with 'A', we earnestly believe that NEP and its implications are very important for the growth of the college by revisioning, re-visioning and repositioning ourselves in the nation-building endeavour. The Board of Directors, Principal, all teaching and non-teaching staff came together in a brainstorming session to consolidate the past experiences and draft a new perspective plan for the period 2023-2033.

2. BACKGROUND

The brainstorming session identified the following as the historical milestones:

1. The event of inauguration of the college in 1997 with the sole purpose to serve the region with equitable quality education for all.
2. Becoming an Autonomous Institution in 2008
3. Completion of first NAAC Accreditation in 2007 and Securing 'B++' Grade
4. Completion of second NAAC Accreditation in 2013 and Securing 'A' Grade
5. Completion of third NAAC Accreditation in 2018 and Securing 'A' Grade
6. ISO Certification 21001:2018 in 2021 (Educational Organizations Management System)
7. Implementing the Spirit of NEP 2020 in Curricula and in the academic and administrative operations of the college, wherever possible
8. Education during COVID and post-COVID

BEST PRACTICE-1

Management Scholarships to Ensure Inclusive and Equitable Quality Education and Promote Lifelong Learning Opportunities for All.

1. This best practice goes along with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 4-“Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.” Being set in a rural area and the economic pressures compounded by the COVID Pandemic has forced us to strategize the need to uphold the value of “inclusive and equitable quality education for all” and this has resulted in the increase of management scholarships in the ensuing Academic Years after COVID Pandemic. This has prevented college drop-outs and learning losses because of economic challenges and facilitated the economically challenged students to reach their education targets.
2. We firmly believe that Quality Education is the foundation of sustainable development, which is a force multiplier which enables self-reliance, boosts economic growth, and improves people’s lives, and provides access to inclusive education can help equip locals with tools required to develop innovative solutions to the world’s greatest problems.
3. This best practice satisfies the NEP 2020 Clause 12.10 (Financial Support for Students) and NEP 2020 Clause 14 (Equity an Inclusion in Higher Education)
4. To realise this, STC has instituted different types of Management Scholarships:



A) MERIT SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is based on marks excluding Language Papers in +2. Students who had scored 81% and above will receive 25% fee concession

B) ECONOMICALLY CHALLENGED SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is based on marks excluding Language Papers in +2. Students who had scored 71% and above will receive 50% fee concession, 60% to 70% will receive 25% fee concession. STC faculty team visits the student's residence to verify the economic background of the student.

C) ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP

25% Fee concession for all PG Courses for those who have completed their UG in STC. Also applicable to brothers and sisters of STC alumni.

D) SIBLING SCHOLARSHIP

Applicable to brothers and sisters of current STC students. 25% Fee concession for all UG Courses. Students with minimum of 50% marks in +2 (excluding language papers) are eligible.

E) MSET SCHOLARSHIP

Scholarship Eligibility Test is conducted in logical, analytical, and English communicative skills. Scholarship is purely based on merit and preference not given to the students of STC. Brochures/mailers are circulated to media and all colleges. The question paper is objective type and the topics included are quantitative aptitude, verbal reasoning, and their subject domain. The results are released along with the counselling schedule on the college website. 100% fee waiver is given for the first 8 ranking students of all the programmes, 50% waiver for the next 32 ranking students of all the programmes. 25% waiver for the next 64 ranking students of all the programmes.

F) SPORTS SCHOLARSHIP

The students who excelled in sports and games in school are identified and supported through various scholarships depending on their achievements. Highly meritorious students get 100% fee waiver. Students with sports proficiency are given free accommodation, nutritious food, and Free Coaching. Substituted internal assessment tests are arranged when they participate in camps, coaches, or matches.

Apart from these, all students are covered under Group Insurance, which covers the College Fees even in case of the death of a parent. We make sure that no student is dropped out of the college because of an economic situation.

G) SCHOLARSHIP FOR CERTIFICATE COURSES

To ensure that financial constraints do not become a hurdle to acquire professional skill sets for STC students, a Certificate Course Scholarship is available. The students are provided with scholarships to augment their skill-sets to suit the industry needs:

- Certified Management Accountant (CMA)
- Tally Certification
- Yoga Certification
- NPTEL certificate courses

5. UNIQUENESS

In the region, STC is the only college which offers these Six types of scholarships significantly contributing

1. To the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 4 – “Ensure inclusive and equitable quality educations and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.”
2. To the Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) of Higher education in India. This helps to meet one of the goals of NEP 2020, Clause 10.8.
3. To ensure equal access for all men and women to affordable and quality technical, vocational, and tertiary education.
4. To facilitate the vulnerable, including with disabilities, to all levels of education including vocational training to add employable skillsets resulting in securing jobs thereby safeguarding a family from falling into or to remain in poverty which is in fact meeting the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 1 (End poverty in all its forms everywhere)

1. This practice goes along with the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goals such as Quality Education (SDG-4), Good Health and Well Being (SDG-3), Reduced Inequalities (SDG-10), Decent Work and Economic Growth (SDG-8) and Clean Water and Sanitation (SDG-6).**
2. Sree Saraswathi Thyagaraja College has a keen sense of social responsibility in response to its philosophy **"When an Institution becomes very important to the society, it no longer belongs only to its founders, but to the whole society"**. The College tries to implement the Sustainable Development Goals by offering Higher Education imbued with societal concern. The institution aims in creating not only meritorious graduates but also responsible citizens. To implement Sustainable Development Goals and inculcate social, environmental, and national responsibilities the college conducts various extension activities throughout the year.
3. The College has 9 Centres, 3 Cells, 2 Councils, 18 clubs and 3 student bodies like NCC, NSS, and Youth Red Cross. Associations of the departments also join hands with clubs and student bodies to exert service to the society. **Centre for Rural Development** along with other departments plays a pivotal role in rendering the elite services.
4. We firmly believe that instead of reinventing the wheel it is better to **align the mission of the college along the UN-Sustainable Development Goals and the principles of NEP** to build the nation strong and to spread the vision of UN by implementing and incorporating a select few SDGs in the regular practice of STC and to serve as the role model in the region in catering quality education, to build a socially fair, equitable, economically viable and environmentally friendly world by moulding students into responsible citizens.
5. **To make the UN-Sustainable Development Goals a reality**, we have taken a few goals in the first phase:

STC Extension Activities with UN-SDGs



A) EDUCATION RELATED (QUALITY EDUCATION - SDG 4)

Sree Saraswathi Thyagaraja College, Pollachi in association with the National Daily Newspaper, The Hindu, Tamil Thisai, organises quiz and career guidance programme for the schools situated in the areas of Pollachi, Palani, Udumalpet and Dharapuram. Toppers were offered Management Scholarships.

B) HEALTH RELATED (GOOD HEALTH AND WELL BEING - SDG 3)

Centre for Rural Development along with other departments organised village household survey under Swatch Bharat Abhiyan for the villages adopted under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA). CRD along with Pollachi Rotary and Indian Immunological Society, Hyderabad constructed Sanitation Block at Government Higher Secondary School, Pollachi & Government High School, Gollapatti. Eye camps, blood donation campaign, vaccination campaigns, Covid-19 Swabs tests were conducted.

C) SOCIAL UPLIFTMENT (REDUCED INEQUALITIES- SDG 10)

The institution has conducted various programmes related to social upliftment. Awareness Rallies related to cancer, drug abuse, child labour, helmet awareness were conducted.

D) EMPLOYMENT RELATED (DECENT WORK AND ECONOMIC GROWTH- SDG-8):

The institution in association with Bombay Stock Exchange organized Investors Awareness Programme. Through the project rural, semi-urban citizens gained awareness in various concepts of savings and investments.

E) ENVIRONMENT RELATED (CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION- SDG-6)

STC is a participating institution under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA), a flagship programme of Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India and has adopted the following villages for their development in collaboration with district administration.

UNIQUENESS

3. NAAC AND STC PERSPECTIVE PLAN 2033

STC has faith in the NAAC criteria and the NAAC assessment process to transform higher education institutes into centres offering superior learning experiences. We believe that if followed in the true spirit of the process, the assessment process can bring a quantum change to the institutional practices. Hence, the current plan and policy has been conceived with NAAC Criteria in mind. Our Core Values reflect NAAC Core Values and the policy document has been cast in NAAC 7-criteria framework. Adopting this framework helps us in self-evaluation on all the indicators and assist us in planning and expansion.

4. THE NEP 2020 AND STC PERSPECTIVE PLAN 2033

The New Education Policy pushes for diversification and expansion in all dimensions. We evaluated the college on the NEP parameters and brainstormed upon the way forward. Expansion without compromising our quality thrust was the goal. This section reflects our discussion process on NEP in 2020. Later, this section was revised based on NAAC and NEP parameters advocated in Nov 2021. In addition to NEP mandate on student strength, the NEP parameters visualized by NAAC were added for the discussion below. These include Multi-disciplinarity/Inter-disciplinarity, Academic Bank of Credit (ABC), Skill Development, Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge System, Focus on Outcome based Education (OBE) and Distance Education/ Online learning.

FORWARD-LOOKING VISION

Given the 21st century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals. It must enable an individual to study one or more specialized areas of interest at a deep level, and also develop character, ethical and Constitutional values, intellectual curiosity, scientific temper, creativity, spirit of service, and 21st century capabilities across a range of disciplines including sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, languages, as well as professional, technical, and vocational subjects. A quality higher education must enable personal accomplishment and enlightenment, constructive public engagement, and productive contribution to the society. It must prepare students for more meaningful and satisfying lives and work roles and enable economic independence.

6. Skill Development Courses
 - a. Currently under the auspices of NSDC we offer skill development courses:
 - NSDC Fee-based non-funded Market LED Program (In 2023, a total of 1093 students completed the courses out of the 1145 enrolled students) – (Roles: Data Associate, Junior Software Developer, Web Developer, Retail Sales Associate and Retail Team Leader)
 - PMKVY 4.0 – Skill Hub Initiative under Ministry of Skill Development and

Entrepreneurship (MSDE) (In 2023, a total of 220 students completed the courses out of the 240 enrolled students) – (Roles: Credit Processing Officer, Micro-Finance Executive and Software Programmer)

- b. Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) under PMKVY 4.0
- c. Special Projects – Participation ration of 60% by Public and 40% by Students
- d. PM Vishwakarma Yojana Scheme – Approved Training Partner among the only 69 in the country.
- e. We have plans to increase the number of participants and the number of courses with an aim to significantly contribute to the nation-building exercise.

5. SCOPE OF THE PERSPECTIVE PLAN




